Chronically homeless men and women have been without permanent residence for years and even decades. Yet, when given the opportunity to better their lives, most do, some in dramatic fashion. Their harsh journeys tell us much about the human spirit and the ability to overcome the most difficult of obstacles, if just given a chance.

Dan Kubas-Meyer has spent the last 15 years in spiritual transition to Unitarianism Universalism, having left the Catholic church of his childhood far behind. Now he is the incoming President of our congregation. He is Executive Director of Riverwood Mental Health Services, the operator of Housing First RI, one of the largest scattered-site supportive housing programs for the chronically homeless in the country.

Michael Currier found a home at First Unitarian in 2007 after making his way through UU congregations in Seattle and in Northampton, Springfield, and Boston, Massachusetts. He lives in Somerset with his partner, Brian Paradis and their dogs. Michael is learning the words to "Je Ne Regrette Rien" and sings it proudly off-key.

Rick Richards is in his third decade at First Unitarian and has remained so long because he has experienced the saving power of words – particularly those spoken from the pulpit, many times at this church. You can infer from this that he sees himself in regular need of salvation, mostly from his own foibles, ignorance, and temper. He thinks church helps.

The Church Office will be closed for holidays on July 4, August 8, and September 5 and for vacation the weeks of July 18 and 25, reopening on Monday, August 1.


Ministry Services from mid-June to early August
