MEMBERSHIP

We are a covenantal community who enter into a promise to be present to one another, to help each other by learning and engaging in this congregation where we commit, grow, and participate in worship, connection, and service.

The Newcomers' Café in the Parish House Paneled Parlor located behind the fireplace, is a welcoming space for those new to our UU congregation to meet people and ask questions. MUSIC COMMITTEE

In partnership with the music director, the music committee sets goals for a vibrant, spiritual music ministry program that enhances and complements worship services and the spiritual pathways program, and serves the church's goals. With the music director they recruit people to participate in musical groups and projects, help interested newcomers find a place in the music program, assure protection and maintenance of the organ and musical instruments, maintain hymnals and printed music collections, provide music communication updates, formulate an annual music budget, and facilitate special fundraising that benefits the music program.

SPIRITUAL PATHWAYS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

Based on our First Unitarian mission, principles, and values, we welcome people in love, creating connections, and fostering inclusion for people of all identities and abilities. We facilitate lifelong learning and help people cultivate spiritual practices through social action and faith development. We

help people cultivate spiritual practices through social action and faith development. W recognize that this is a journey that we walk together, in compassion and justice.

First Unitarian offers a comprehensive faith development program for children and youth from infancy through early adulthood during the school year. In the summer, a program for young children is provided each Sunday.

Most Sundays during the church school year, young people age pre-kindergarten through seventh grade will first go to their individual classrooms to check in and then go to auditorium for a chapel worship before returning to their classrooms. On holidays and other important Sundays, youth join adults in the Meeting House for a multigenerational service.

Chapel services incorporate a blend of music, art, meditation, stories, celebrations, and listening. Classes are taught by a dedicated group of volunteers who teach in teams.

Spiritual Pathways is pleased to open registration for our 2023-24 programs. We begin on September 19 and programs will run from 10:30am-12pm.

Nursery Care will be available in the Earth Room, floor 2, for children ages 0-3.

Children and youth meet in their classrooms at 10:30am. Our elementary children join for weekly **Children's Chapel** in the Auditorium to explore the big spiritual questions of life, make meaning, create community belonging, and learn about our Unitarian Universalist values. In 2023-24 we will have a special justice focus in the fall on peacemaking, and in the spring on climate issues.

Spirit Play [https://spirit-play.com/] is our new program for PreK. This story-based program gives young children the time and space to explore our Unitarian Universalist stories and make their own activity choices from specially curated activities guided by spiritual "Wondering Questions."

K-1st graders will be in the Sky Room, floor 2. They continue their beloved program **Creating Home**, with new supplements from Spirit Play this year.

Our 2-3rd graders will meet in the 3rd floor Moon Room. This year's program is the UUA's **Love Will Guide Us.** Our children will join in the conversation on the Article II proposal about our new values statement, which holds Love as our central spiritual value. The 2-3rd graders also plan to help lead the congregation in special multigenerational climate justice activities from UU Ministry for the Earth this spring.

Crossing Paths, our world religions program for 4-6th graders meets in the Diversity Room on floor 3. This special program uses hiking as a metaphor to guide the children on a year-long exploration of the history and beliefs of UUism and other religions, including monthly visits to local houses of worship.

The **Coming of Age** program for middle schoolers, a UU Identity-building program with special mentors from the congregation, meets in the first floor Haynes Room. This program helps budding youth explore their place in the congregation through volunteer service, worship, and spiritual practices. These youth and their families will host the annual winter Taco Supper as a fundraiser for their UU History learning trip in spring 2024. You can look forward to their worship service in spring 2024 as well!

Youth Group for high schoolers will meet in the basement level Youth Room. Our youth develop their own deep (or sometimes silly) "Mondo Cosmic Questions" to discuss; attend and even host regional Youth Cons; participate in service projects and learning; and lead worship and music for the whole congregation.

We offer a vibrant small group ministry program for new or long-time members that provides opportunities to become more connected and engaged. Groups meet twice monthly, in person and virtually, to explore topics of importance and interest. Church members are trained as facilitators who plan, lead, promote, and oversee the program, meeting monthly with the Assistant Minister for support. Groups share a common format: chalice lighting, check in, sharing of responses to a topic or a reading, check out, and closing. Members develop a covenant for how they will relate to each other and to the larger community. Watch for fall and spring opportunities to try a "Circles Sampler."

Soul Circles focus on a single topic for long and deep exploration. Some examples are Creative Aging, Living LGBTQ, and the Grief Journey. Groups also participate in service projects together.

Chalice Circles focus on topics that inspire and reflect on daily lives, providing an avenue for religious growth and spiritual meaning. Groups meet on varying days and times for two hours per session. People are asked to commit to 8-10 sessions. Contact:

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.



OUR CARING COMMUNITY

First U Pastoral Care Network is a network of support available for members and friends of the congregation in times of illness, stress, or transition, as well as practical assistance with transportation or other daily needs. In addition to our Assistant Minister for Pastoral Care, Rev. Roger Peltier, we offer a Buddy Program to pair folks in supportive relationship, a Caring Crew to assist with rides, meals and other practical support, and unparalleled grief support.

BUDDY PROGRAM matches parishioners, in pairs, who commit to call each other once per week to check-in. This hugely popular program has been the basis for some deep friendships. You may request a buddy at any time.

CARING CREW provides help with logistical needs: rides, meals, and errands. Parish Care volunteers do not receive special training. They are simply folks willing to help others in times of need in concrete ways. It is a ministry of "doing" rather than simply being present.

LAY MINISTRY TEAM is a small group of volunteers, invited and trained to assist the Assistant Minister with congregational pastoral needs. Their work complements, does not replace, the pastoral care offered by our ordained ministers. This confidential ministry is grounded in being present and listening, rather than doing or fixing. Lay Ministers are not professional counselors or therapists but trained individuals who understand that all may need help at times, whether in an important life transition, a serious health condition, or another personal struggle.

MINDFUL GRIEVING is a five-session small group that meets periodically throughout the church year. Groups are led by skilled volunteers and use many tools to help deal with significant loss. After completing Mindful Grieving sessions, participants are invited into the continuing, Grief Journey Soul Circle.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR INVOLVEMENT

THE WOMEN'S ALLIANCE

The First U Women's Alliance was established in 1882, incorporated in 1904, and affiliated with the church in 2014. The mission is to: offer enrichment through timely and informative programs; nurture opportunities for friendship, inspiration, and support among the members; and contribute to community organizations benefitting women, children, and families through fundraising activities and service. Meetings are first Mondays each month, October through May with an annual outing in June. Meetings, recently, are hybrid with gatherings in the church Auditorium and screened via zoom to members at home. Membership dues support programs and administrative expenses. All fundraising profits, like the annual "Antiques and Uniques" Indoor Yard Sale, benefit selected charitable organizations supporting women and families. HISTORY COMMITTEE

The History Committee gathers and maintains church historical records and shares its 300-year history with the congregation. Publications include "Pastors' Rest," describing the church's five-acre Swan Point Cemetery burial ground. In 2020 the History Committee and the 300th Anniversary Committee celebrated 300 years of the congregation with banners, performances, and commemorative items. The Committee continues to support the efforts researching the church's involvement with the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade and the Business of Slavery throughout RI. ANNUAL COMMITMENT DRIVE

FINANCE / INVESTMENT COMMITTEE and FINANCE / DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEES

These committees were created by PruComm policies to help advise the Treasurer and PruComm on varied financial assets of the church. The Investment arm meets to review our endowment funds and investment strategies. These volunteers also review the fund manager's performance. The Development arm, chaired by the Assistant Treasurer, investigates vehicles for church fund-raising. They also advise and support church planned giving programs, such as the Benevolent Society.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

This religious community has the stewardship responsibility for maintaining one of the most iconic, historic structures in the state of Rhode Island. In continuing that responsibility, this committee enlists the many technical and skilled talents of our membership as a "B & G Resource Group" to consult in this task, including safety, comfort, energy efficiency, and green efforts.

GOVERNANCE - LAY LEADERSHIP

The congregation operates under a system of congregational polity as defined in the church's constitution and by-laws. Voting members of the congregation hold the right and responsibility to decide major issues which affect the church including calling a minister, electing members to leadership positions, and adopting an annual budget. The congregation conducts its business at an annual meeting in June when it elects board members, officers, and deacons, and approves an annual budget. Special meetings are called as needed.

These volunteer teams help provide leadership to hold the congregation's mission and vision.

PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE

The Prudential Committee (PruComm) is the governing board of the church. It is composed of six officers and six other voting members of the church. PruComm members are elected to three-year terms; officers are elected annually to one-year terms (Clerk, Treasurer, and Assist. Treasurer are renewable). Four committee members serve as liaisons to the four ministries of the church: Spiritual Development, Community Life and Heritage, Stewardship, and Social Justice. They gather the ministry around common goals and support groups and leadership. The PruComm sets policy, long-term goals, establishes committees, hires professional staff other than the minister, manages the operating budget in accordance with the by-laws, and performs other necessary duties.
